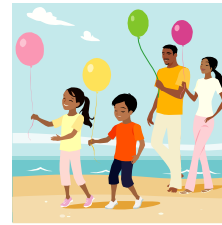
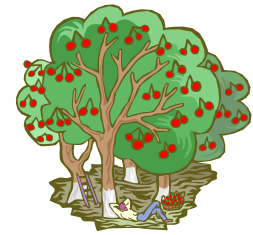

Sue is a great one for getting us involved in the Service and she asked if we had any special memories of our fathers. Most of the congregation said yes, they had indeed good memories of their dads.

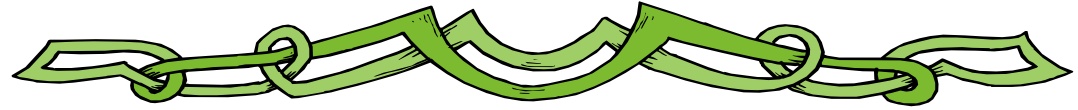
I certainly remember mine, although it is more than fifty years since he died. He was true Anglican, and I am not sure he would be best pleased with my change of faith.
